

Spend summer evenings learning the basics of permaculture design and ethics. Lectures and discussions will be augmented by hands-on experience as we explore such topics as pattern recognition, water harvesting, landscape design, and other methods for designing with nature.

Permaculture principles enable people to establish productive environments providing food, shelter, energy, material and non-material needs, as well as the social and economic infrastructures to support them.

Scott Pittman is well known as a senior teacher and collaborator with Bill Mollison, the grand old man of Permaculture. Qi is energy. 'Gong' is practice; therefore a practice of cultivating energy. Students will learn the 5 sequences of Soaring Crane Qi gong founded in China in 1979, as well as its place in Chinese medicine. Of the two applications of Qi Gong, martial arts and , China Soaring Crane belongs to the category of health maintenance Qi Gong. Focusing mind and breath, through physical movement, this practice improve the flow of "qi" by opening the meridians (internal energy pathways) and clearing blockages. The practice promotes physical and mental health leading to a greater sense of harmony with the Earth.

Mark Turner began practicing Zhan Zhuang Qi gong and Ba Duan Jin with Master Lam in London, where he was introduced to Soaring Crane Qigong. Mark continued training in Southeast Asia, under Shifu Ho, the respected teacher of China Soaring Crane Qigong. In this comprehensive two-day hands-on organic gardening course we will cover basic techniques for successful gardening in Northern New Mexico. Emphasis will be placed on low-water gardening. Registrants before May 9th will receive FREE gardening materials at the class.

Soil Preparation-Saturday, May 18th from 9:30 to 4:30 - Tuition \$55

Growing soll not plants produces healthier plants and vegetables. This workshop focuses on techniques to develop your soil to its fullest. Hands-on activities include double digging to give the soil deep places to store water and air, site selection, composting to provide nutrients for the soil, worms to vitalize the soil, soil testing with organic additive use, and mulching/wind breaks/ sheet mulching to counteract the effects of wind.

Planting and Caring for the Garden Sunday, May 19th from 9:30 to 4:30 - Tuition \$55

A successful garden combines knowledge and experimentation. This workshop focuses on methods of planting as well as care. Hands-on activities include developing a garden plan, sowing-pricking from flats-transplanting, seed collecting, watering techniques from roof catchments, and earth friendly insect and gopher control.

Priscilla Logan has been establishing gardens in New Mexico for over twenty years in backyards, mountain meadows, and in rural and urban schools. We will look at Pre-Colombian farming techniques in the Upper Rio Grande Bioregion. These Native American farmers not only survived but thrived in an environment where we struggle today. How did they accomplish this? What can we learn from them? The course will cover ancient crops, tools, seasonal cycles, and water catchment structures. The Saturday class will be at the EcoVersity where Joel will present a slide show, lecture and discuss the story of Anasazi gardening. We will also plant a small waffle garden. On Sunday, we will meet for a field trip to visit prehistoric agricultural sites in Northern New Mexico. Participants may join us for either Saturday or Sunday, or preferably both days.

VW2-04 MUSHROOM GROWING FOR HOME USE- Danny Rhodes

This course will demonstrate a simple method for growing mushrooms in your own kitchen. A recently developed method using hydrogen peroxide makes home cultivation easy, fun and inexpensive. Participants will take home a starter batch of shitake spawn and growing medium. The course will also include identification of the main types of edible mushrooms, a brief history of fungi, and an overview of the mushroom ecology.

Danny Rhodes developed his interest in mushrooms while attending the Western Culinary Institute in Portland Oregon. Paul Stamets' presentations at the Telluride Mushroom Festival and at the Bioneers Conference inspired him to grow mushrooms commercially. He is the founder of Desert Fungi, and can be encountered selling his mushrooms at the Santa Fe Farmers Market.

In this class we will learn to make an inexpensive "backyard" biodiesel processor and make a reliable, renewable fuel whose main ingredient will be recycled cooking oil from local restaurants. Rudolph Diesel's first engine was designed to run on biodiesel. This fuel emits no net carbon dioxide making it an environmentally friendly alternative way to run diesel vehicles. We will produce a batch of fuel, and demonstrate its use in running a diesel engine. There will be a presentation of successful biodiesel use by individuals and organizations from around the world, as well as its potential from small scale to mass production.

Nicholas Espeset became interested in alternate fuels in the 1970's while working for NASA's Technology Application Center researching wind, solar and hydrogen technologies. As a technical consultant and project manager his projects range from motion picture special effects, to economics of seaweed harvesting, to systems planning for rural development. At Chaco Canyon the ancient ones maintained the equilibrium of earth and sky. They watched the stars, tilled the soil, carried water and kept the fires down through the ages. This ceremonial site of the Americas still carries a strong presence. It has the power to inspire and awaken in us a response to these troubling times. If we listen and move with attention, it opens us to the larger conversation of earth and sky.

We are calling this journey to Chaco Canyon a pilgrimage: In the company of each other, and in the spirit of this ancient place, we will open to its mysteries. look for guidance, examine personal and ecological mind and rejoin body, mind and heart with the larger whole.

During these five days we will be sitting in silence; moving with and through the landscape with Ruth, learning the ecology and history of the canyon, hiking with Colleen to Pueblo Alto and other archeological sites, and learning star knowledge. Colleen will also share her understandings from crosscultural wisdom maps of wholeness. These maps are integrative tools revealing the relationships between earth and sky, the elements and the potential enlightened qualities. We will conclude our stay with a ceremonial performance, which will evoke collective and personal guidance for the times ahead.

Ruth Zaporah is a New Mexico based performance artist, director and teacher internationally known for her innovative work in physical theater improvisation and performance. She is author of, Action Theatre: The Improvisation
